Celebrating Excellence: Our 2025 SEA Games Campaign

The 33rd SEA Games in Bangkok-Chonburi, Thailand, will be remembered as a watershed moment for Singaporean sports. Team Singapore, our largest contingent ever, delivered the nation's best-ever medal haul at an away Games, securing a total of 202 medals and finishing a commendable 5th in the overall standings. Within this national success story, our Cuesports athletes carved out a chapter of brilliance and resilience. Competing in the disciplines of billiards and snooker, our contingent contributed significantly to the national tally, showcasing skill, strategy, and sportsmanship at the highest regional level.

Our Medal Achievement stood at 1 Gold, 1 Silver, 3 Bronzes. Each medal represents countless hours of focused practice, mental fortitude, and unwavering dedication. Our athletes competed not just for personal glory, but as proud representatives of Singapore, upholding the highest standards of our sport. Their success on this regional stage is a powerful testament to their individual talent and the structured support system we are building together.

Building the Future: The Cuesports Singapore National Training Centre as a Centre of Excellence

While we celebrate our achievements, our responsibility is to ensure the champions of tomorrow have an even stronger platform. This vision is now being realised through the Cuesports Singapore National Training Centre, officially designated as our Centre of Excellence (COE) which was officially opened on 30 May 2026.

Located at 371, Tanjong Katong Road, the Academy is more than a venue—it is the beating heart of our high-performance strategy. It serves as the official training ground for our national athletes and development squads, providing them with tournament-quality equipment and facilities.

Strategic Objectives of Our Centre of Excellence:

- **Talent Development Pipeline:** We will implement structured training programmes catering to all levels, from our national team to youth development squads.
- **Solving a Critical Barrier:** For too long, the development of youth cuesports has been hampered by age restrictions common in many public venues. The NTC directly solves this by providing a fully accessible, training-friendly facility open to all ages, thereby democratising access to the sport.
- **Creating Career Pathways:** By expanding our COE network and national ranking tournaments, we aim to create sustainable career pathways for athletes. This includes opportunities to transition into Spex Potential and Spex for athletes who show potential, certified coaching and officiating roles, ensuring that our veterans remain integral to the ecosystem.
- **Transforming Perceptions:** We are acutely aware of the outdated stereotypes associated with cuesports. The NTC is a cornerstone of our mission to rebrand it as a modern, disciplined “gentleman's game” and a sport which can be enjoyed at all levels and ages by the community.

A Unified Vision for Growth

Our journey does not end here. The success at the SEA Games and the launch of the COE are interconnected catalysts. The medals inspire our next generation, and the Academy provides them the tools to achieve their own dreams.

Our immediate roadmap includes:

- **Expanding the COE Network:** We intend to collaborate with corporate and community partners to develop more such centres across Singapore, widening our geographical reach and talent pool.
- **Strengthening Competitions:** We are committed to revitalising our national competition structure, including hosting National and ranking championships and tournaments, increasing the number of ranking tournaments to provide regular, high-quality competitive exposure for our athletes.
- **Continued Advocacy:** We will keep working closely with national bodies and other organisations to align our programmes with national sporting objectives and continue elevating the status of cuesports.

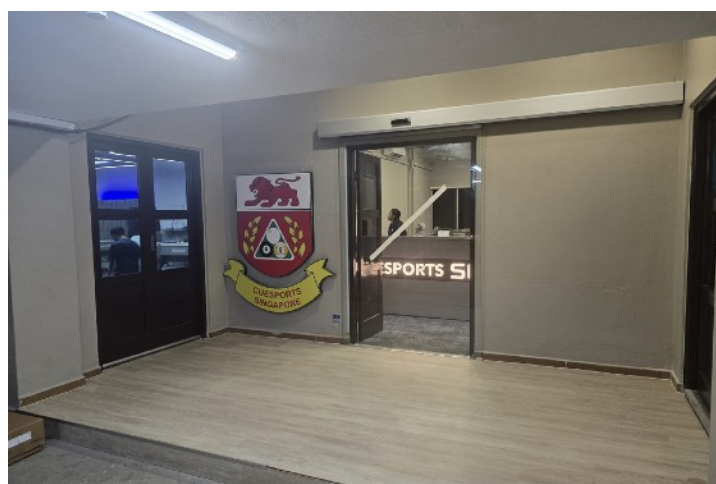
UNVEILING THE NEW CUESPORTS SINGAPORE NATIONAL TRAINING CENTRE

History

The original Cuesports Academy was inaugurated on 25 February 2018 and based its home at Katong Shopping Centre serving as the National Training Centre for Cuesports Singapore.



In February 2024, the premises were sold and converted to a food and beverage outlet and Cuesports Singapore ceased all operations at the old Academy on 3 November 2024. Thereafter, Cuesports Singapore embarked on a quest to look for a suitable alternative location to house its National Training Centre (NTC). Various options were considered and explored to no avail. Thankfully, through the assistance of Sport Singapore, Cuesports Singapore was able to lease the former Canadian International School located at 371 Tanjong Katong Road.



Current Location

The current location of the new Cuesports Singapore NTC cannot be more ideal. It is located along Tanjong Katong Road within short walking distance of Tanjong Katong MRT on the brown line and readily accessible by public transport. There are also many good eating places around the premises including pubs, restaurants and Dunman Food Centre.

Cuesports Singapore is occupying Block C.

Official Opening of the Cuesports Singapore NTC on 30 May 2026

The National Training Centre was officially opened on 30 May 2026. The Centre was opened with great fanfare and the occasion was graced by Dr Su Chun Wei, Chief HPSI, Mr Low Jia Ren, Deputy Chief HPSI as well as representatives from our major sponsors and donors namely Mr Max Ng of Tong Seng Produce Pte Ltd, Mr Terence Teo of TE Capital Partners, Mr William Lim of Sin Soon Lee Realty Company Pte Ltd and Mr Koh Seng Chuan of Sunray Woodcraft Construction. Attendees were treated to exhibition matches between SEAG Gold Medallist in Snooker Rory Thor and our own players Sunny Wang, Reynard Lee and Bryan Lim. Our attendees were also able to witness the youth development under 16 programmes in progress under the watchful supervision of coach Ricky Chew. With the set up of the new Cuesports NTC, Cuesports Singapore has fulfilled its goal of establishing a Centre of Excellence which will serve as a permanent training centre for Elite athletes and developmental athletes. It will provide a conducive environment for daily training, school programmes and suitable venue for domestic and regional tournaments to be staged there.



It will house 9 brand new Rasson pool tables, 1 Blue Diamond table and 4 brand new Rasson snooker tables.

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Operational Hours

The operational hours of CSA on weekdays and weekends will be from 12 noon to 1 am including public holidays (except for the first two days of the Chinese New Year).

Corporate Packages

As part of its efforts to broaden and strengthen its community outreach to corporate organisations, associations, clubs and other bodies, various corporate packages incorporating exhibitions and clinics will be offered by the Academy. These packages can also be customised to suit the needs of each customer. More details on these packages can be obtained from the Centre Manager Ms Lily Liew at sdm@cuesports.org.sg.

Admission into the Academy is only open to members and their guests. Limited parking is available in the premises and members intending to use the carpark would need to pre-register their vehicles online on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Meet Our Centre Manager LILY LIEW



Lily Liew is a familiar face in the Cuesports scene. Not only is she a qualified referee having officiated at numerous local and overseas tournaments, she is also currently Sports Development Manager with Cuesports Singapore and was formerly Centre Manager for the old Cuesports Academy located at Katong Shopping Centre. Lily brings to the new Centre her wealth and depth of experience in Centre management and running of tournaments.

Can you share with us about your experience as a referee?

Lily : I started my refereeing journey before joining the Cuesports Singapore's management team. I was accredited as an ACBS Silver Grade referee in 2015 and in the same year, one of my most memorable milestones was representing Singapore at the 2015 SEA Games, which were held locally. I had the honour of officiating the Women's 9-Ball Final, which was a very meaningful experience for me. I would also like to mention two other highlights. The first was the 2017 Eden World Women's Snooker Championship held in Singapore where I had the privilege of refereeing the tournament. Another highlight would be the 2017 SEA Games in Kuala Lumpur, where Team Singapore achieved three gold medals across three different disciplines. Being part of that historic achievement as a referee was extremely fulfilling. I was also the Team Manager for Cuesports Singapore at the recent SEA Games event in Thailand where Singapore clinched one Gold, one Silver and three Bronzes. As team manager, I had to oversee the welfare of our players and ensure that they are well supported during the tournament period. My most recent refereeing experience in overseas tournaments took place from 11 to 15 April 2026 where I officiated as a referee at the Asian Heyball Open Championship in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia organised by the Asian Confederation of Billiard Sports.

Apart from refereeing, you were previously also organising tournaments for Cuesports Singapore. Can you share about that too?

Lily : Alongside refereeing, I have always had a strong passion for organising tournaments. I am grateful that Cuesports Singapore has allowed me to be involved in the organisation of local, regional and international events, where I have also served as Tournament Director in the regional and international events. The organisation of tournaments also helps me in my role as Centre Manager of CSA where tournaments are held in the Centre.

What are the plans for the new CSA and what do you personally hope to achieve through it?

Lily : The new CSA is envisioned as a central hub for cue sports development—from grassroots participation to high-performance training. Personally, I hope to see the centre nurture more local talent, support national athletes more effectively, and become a space where players, coaches, officials, and the community can grow together.

My plan for CSA? In 2026, the focus will be on expanding programmes, increasing competitions and events, and strengthening development pathways for athletes and officials. We also aim to position the CSA as a key venue for both national and international cuesports activities. In addition, we also hope to enhance community engagement through organisation of corporate and social events which incorporate clinics, workshops and mini competitions.

Interview with National Snooker Coach BERNARD TEY CHOON KIAT



Prior to taking up coaching, Bernard had already distinguished himself as an all rounded Cuesports athlete. In 1995, he won the Gold Medal in Chiang Mai SEA Games as part of the victorious Singapore 9-Ball Pool team and 22 years later, he repeated that distinction in winning the Gold Medal in the Men's Snooker Doubles event with Partner Chan Keng Kwang in the 2017 Kuala Lumpur SEA Games. This is rare feat across two disciplines. His playing career is defined by longevity and peak success at the SEA Games coming some 22 years apart and Bernard continues to compete as a top-tier competitor domestically and overseas in numerous tournaments.

How has being a player helped you as a coach?

Bernard : Being a player myself, I developed concentration, strategy thinking and mental and emotional discipline. I started playing at club level matches and friendly competitions and along the way, I spent time refining my skills such as my cue action, shot selection and I discovered that the sport has helped me in terms of discipline, decision making and importance of focus and learning from my mistakes.

Why did you take up coaching?

Bernard : After years of playing, I developed a deeper understanding of technique, tactics, match psychology and most importantly, how to deal with the pressures of match play. I felt that it was time to impart what I have learnt with my juniors and other athletes. As a coach, I can also stay closely connected with the sport and help mentor and shape the next generation of players and contribute to the sport in a meaningful way.

What are some of your memorable experiences or highlights as a coach?

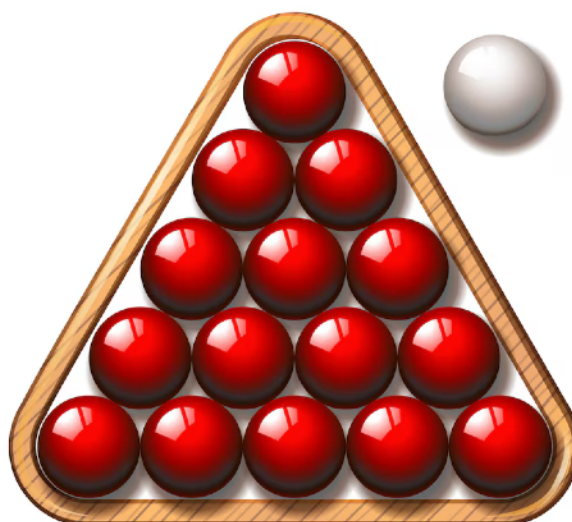
Bernard : I have accompanied and attended numerous tournaments locally and overseas including the recent SEA Games as a coach to support our players. I find satisfaction in helping them manage the high pressure and conditions where mental strength and discipline are critical to success.

What are your plans for snooker development in Singapore?

Bernard : My immediate priority is to identify suitable talent to be included in the pipeline of athletes which we can mentor and groom to represent Singapore in future tournaments. I would also like to incorporate techniques learnt from other countries and coaches such as video analysis, technical monitoring to help refine the skills of our players and also help them develop match temperament for more consistent performance in tournaments. With the support of Cuesports Singapore, I also hope to send our players for more overseas tournaments and training where they can gain greater exposure through playing other players.

Finally, any words of encouragement for aspiring snooker players?

Bernard : Snooker is a game which rewards patience, hard work and discipline. Contrary to popular misconception, snooker is not just about potting but encompasses other skills like shot selection and safety play to create scoring opportunities. Players can only improve through hard work, development of good habits and by staying humble and teachable.



Meet Our Referee SERENE ONG

Referees are an essential and integral part of the Cuesports ecosystem. They play a key role in ensuring that the rules and regulations of the sport are upheld and implemented during matches to ensure fair play and integrity.

In this segment, we are privileged to feature Serene Ong, a referee who has a powerful story. She has managed to overcome her visual impairment to becoming a successful referee who is a regular at our tournaments and matches.



Can you tell us something about yourself and involvement in refereeing?

Serene : Hi everyone. I am a Cuesports referee and took up my referee course in 2017 and have been refereeing ever since. Refereeing has been a challenge for me. I had an incident in 2013 where the vision in my left eye was impaired. However, I have refused to let that be a setback in my life. When my driving licence was revoked, I retook my driving licence in 2015 after my eye incident, had to undergo eye tests at SGH in order to retake my driving test and managed to pass my test. I am still driving today. I also took up pool after my eye incident.

What challenges did you face in becoming a referee?

Serene : To be honest, the biggest challenge is to overcome certain prejudicial misconception that I can't referee because of my visual impairment in the left eye. There were some players who had doubts over my ability. However, this only spurred me on to put in extra effort in my refereeing. Over time, I have managed to gain the confidence and trust of players.

What are some of your memorable experiences as a referee?

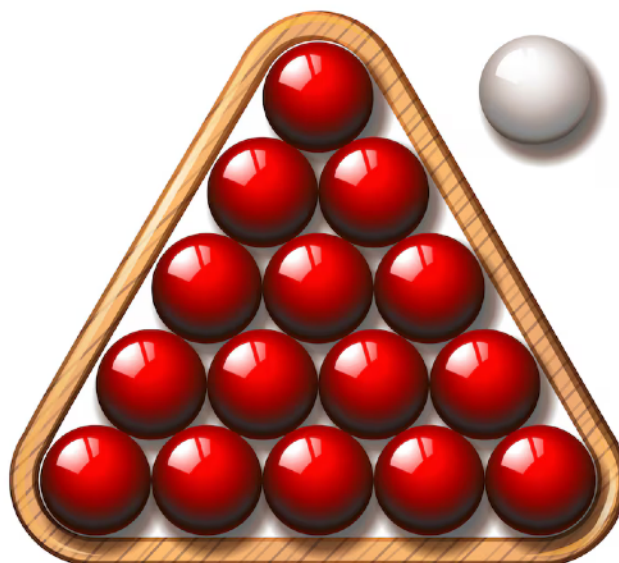
Serene : Thanks to Cuesports Singapore and my mentors like Lily Liew, I have had the privilege of refereeing not

only in local tournaments but the opportunity to referee in international tournaments in the UK, Ireland and Belgium. Perhaps the most memorable experience for me was the opportunity to referee the exhibition matches involving Ronnie O'Sullivan, Zhao Xintong and Nutcharat Wongharuthai (Mink) in 2022 at ROSSA in Singapore.



What words of advice would you give to aspiring referees?

Serene : I would like to encourage those who are interested to take up the referee course which Cuesports Singapore conducts from time to time. Refereeing is a very fulfilling vocation. Come and join our referee family where there is close camaraderie and who knows, maybe one day, you will also have the chance like me to referee in overseas tournaments. You definitely won't regret it!

SINGAPORE'S VERY OWN ALOYSIUS YAPP SECURES WPA MEN'S 8-BALL WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP TITLE

Singapore's leading Cuesports athlete Aloysius Yapp has once again done the nation proud by capturing the WPA Men's 8-Ball World Championship cementing his status among the world's top professional pool players.



Having distinguished himself already in 9 Ball and 10 Ball, this latest accolade places Aloysius in an elite group of players to have won the world championship. Aloysius showcased exceptional skill and composure throughout the tournament coming through a tough field. This included a 10-4 commanding win over Poland's Wiktor Zielinski in the semi-finals capped by a decisive 10-4 victory against Spain's Francisco Sanchez Ruiz in the finals. This historic win caps off an outstanding 2025 season during which Aloysius had claimed various major titles and is a testament to his consistency and remarkable skill at the highest level of competition.

Cuesports Singapore proudly acknowledges Aloysius Yapp's remarkable feat. It represents a significant milestone for Singapore cuesports on the world stage. His success will also serve to inspire the next generation of athletes and reinforce Singapore's standing in the global Cuesports scene.

Time commitment to the sport has been a challenge as it hasn't been commercially viable in the past to pursue it as much as I would have liked to.

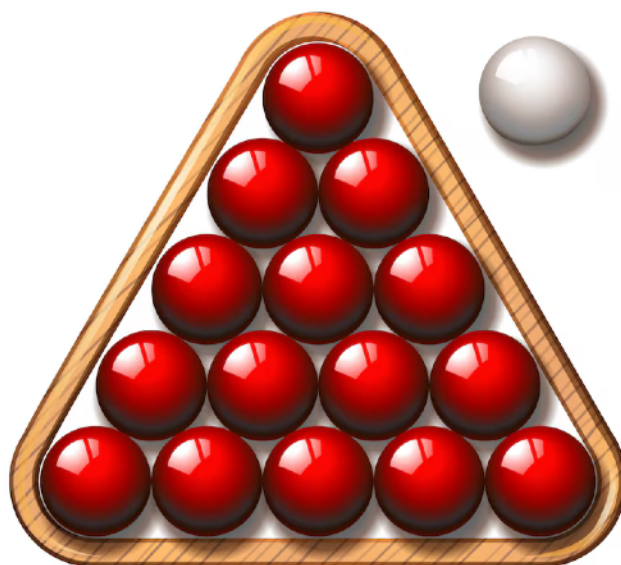
The Spex programme ought to help greatly there as it would provide much needed support so I can compete with the best in the world on a regular basis and continue to get better.

What are some goals you hope to achieve in the next 3 to 5 years in your sporting career?

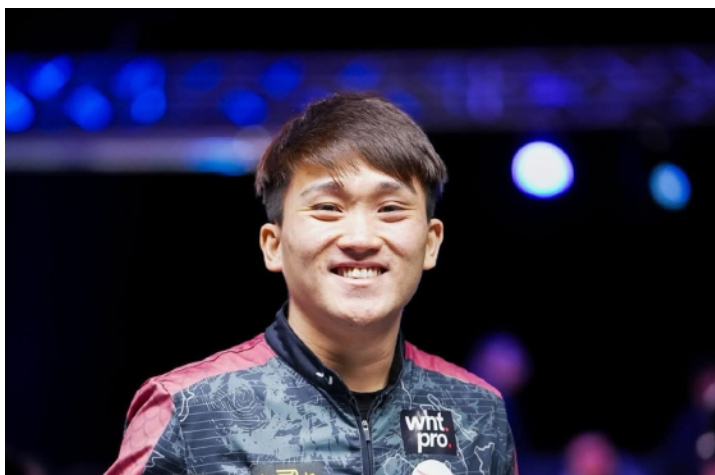
Hoping to translate the Silver from the 2025 SEA Games into Gold at the upcoming editions.

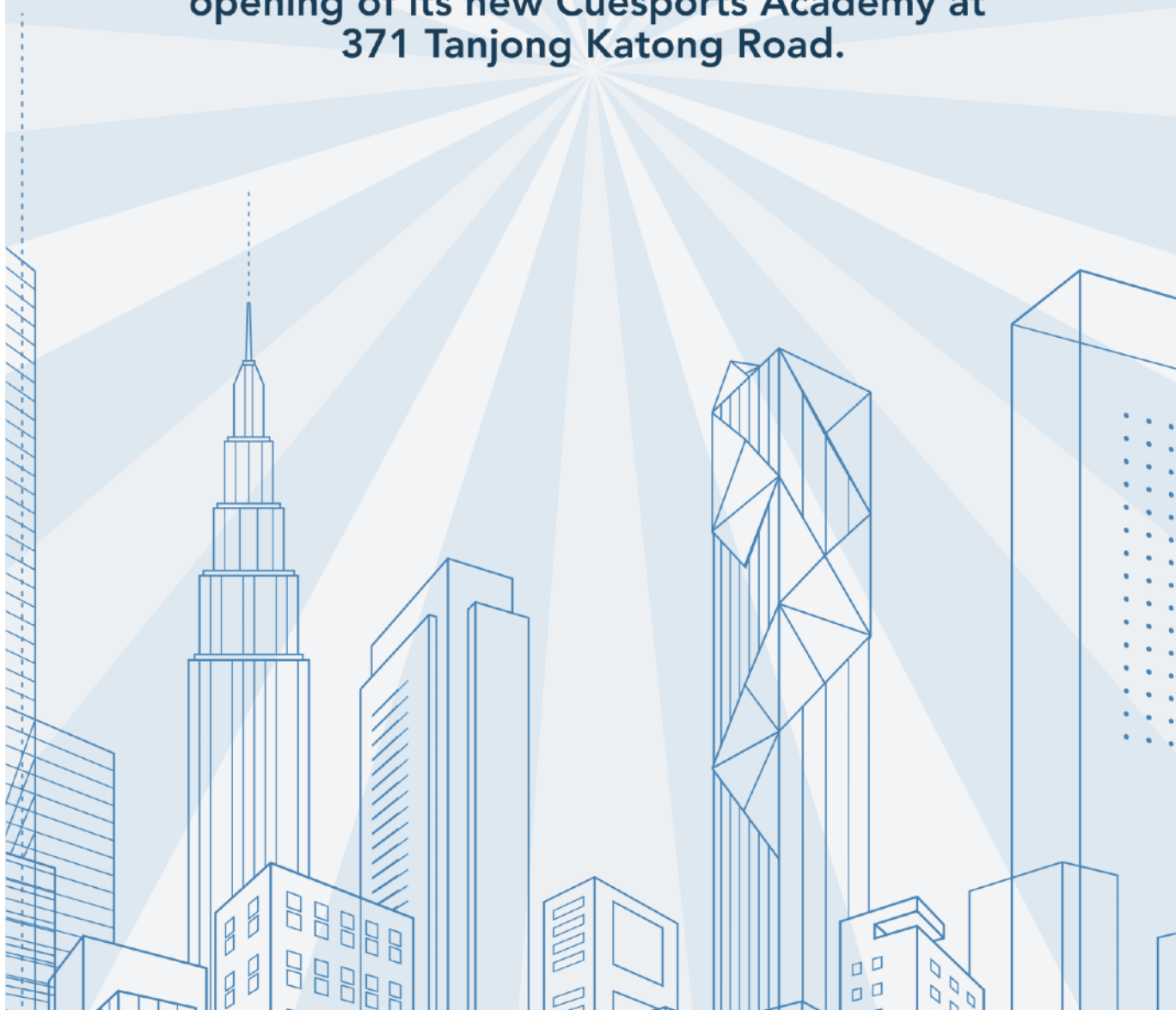
